Starting School

All the children will start school on a part-time basis.

This allows the children to have time to get to know each other and to explore their new environment, whilst we get to know them.

Early Years Foundation Stage

The Foundation Stage Curriculum is based on the recognition that young children learn best through play, active learning and creative thinking.

The curriculum has 7 areas of learning that enable the children to develop their social, communicative and physical skills, whilst progressing academically.

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




























What is forest School?

- Forest School takes place in a woodland or natural wooded environment to support the development of a relationship between the learner and the natural world.
- Forest School aims to promote the development of all those involved, fostering resilient, confident, independent and creative learners.
- Forest School offers learners the opportunity to take supported risks appropriate to the environment and to themselves.
- Forest School is led by a qualified Forest School practitioner.

Reading and phonics

- The children begin to learn phonics as soon as they are settled in school
- We use Letters and Sounds to teach phase 1. This is where they learn the skills they need to listen carefully to sounds and be able to distinguish between sounds. Activities will also include rhyme and rhythm, alliteration-hearing and identifying the same first sound. Lastly oral blending-putting sounds together and segmenting the sounds in a word-breaking a word into the sounds. Once the children are secure with phase 1 we use Read Write Inc phonics to systematically teach the children the sounds and their letters, and how to blend them to read and segment words to write
- Children will have reading books to support their phonics and reading at home.
- Phonics sessions for parents in October

Maths in Foundation Stage

- The main focus is teaching early number sense.
- This involves teaching...
- Comparison-having a feel for the relative size of numbers, putting them in order and estimating.
- Cardinality- knowing the number names in order, forwards and backwards, understanding how to count objects, events or actions.
- Composition-understanding how each number can be made up in different ways.


How are we going to teach early number sense?

- · Explore number patterns and relationships



Class Dojo Reward System

- Class Dojo. This is a whole school interactive rewards system but is also a way of communicating between teachers and parents. Children have their own monster emoji which they can personalise. They then receive dojo points for good learning, following rules etc.
- Parents will be given a login and can download the app on their phone. They get to see how many dojo points their child receives and what for. They can also send and receive messages to/from the class teacher.


Starting School Induction Timeline

Home Visits

- As part of the induction process we will offer each family a home visit.
